NO NEED TO MAKE EXCUSES



There is a great deal to be learned by watching and listening if there is the patience and awareness and one

week in June there were two events that provided an important life truth.

The first happened at a fast food restaurant. It's one of those places where you pull up to a spot under an overhang and push a button and they will come to your automobile with your food. Sometimes they roller-skate to your car. That happened on a Sunday night in June. The waitperson was a young man and he was carrying a tray on which were located iced coffee and a frozen strawberry drink. He was a skilled skater. He carried off the image of Brian Boitano or Katerina Witt. He did a pirouette on route to our car. He had grace in his gait. There was a glide to his weaving toward our awaiting vehicle until he got just up to the front of it. He tripped and almost fell. The fact that he was able to balance the drinks on the tray was absolutely heroic and the fact that he did not fall all the way to the ground was a defeat of most of the laws of gravity. When he stumbled over to the car, undone by what he had done, he said, "Some idiot put stones out here."

The second event happened out-

side a Home Depot store on a Monday around noon. Monday is my day off. It also involved fast food. It was at the hot dog stand. There were two young men sitting on one of the benches looking kind of green. There was another young man holding a cell phone and he was talking to his boss. He said to his boss, "Well, I cooked them just like you told me to and I have two guys who are saying they have been throwing up since an hour after they ate the 'dogs'." Actually, I had in mind purchasing a couple hot dogs and taking them home for our lunch, but that report and the jaundiced look on the faces of the two former customers modified the menu for lunch that day for us.

There must come a time in our lives when we need not make excuses for ourselves and can take ownership for what we do or fail to do. This brings us to some suggested resolutions made not at the beginning of the year but in the middle of the year.

No more excuses related to what didn't get accomplished. We will try to do the impossible, but will settle in on what is possible and let it go.

No more apologizing that we do not live up to other people's expectation. We will heed their advice, and will appreciate their constructive criticism, but, at the end of the day, the assessment of what was accomplished will be

based on the vision created by our value system.

No more using the excuse that we were blocked from doing what we had agreed to do. We will own what we do, and will take responsibility for correcting the problems we have created ourselves.

Finally, there will be a moratorium on blaming the past, our parents, or the plots that have been set against us. We cannot change what has been, but we have much control over what will be.

Sometimes, the loneliest place to stand is face to face with ourselves. Our faith continues to remind us we are sons and daughters of God, and our Christianity will always call us to the future. Harvey Potthoff reflected on seeing God as the "Wholeness-Reality". He believed that seeing God in this way "is to know the worth of being alive as a person. It is to discover a firm basis for self-acceptance and self-affirmation. To accept the gift of life in this light is to celebrate the gift of one's own uniqueness as a human being. It is to worship the God of life."

The time has come to live like we worship the God of life.

Vacation Bible School was a huge success again this year! We had over 140 children attend our Son Force Kids VBS. Special thanks are extended to our co-directors, Barb Grauberger, Stephanie Tomasini and Becci Ragatz – it wouldn't have been possible without them.

We had about 80 willing and smiling volunteers, including

some great teen helpers, who made the week a huge success – THANK YOU!! It was great to use our remodeled sanctuary for the daily opening programs and our parent program on Thursday night. Our theme words for the week were: Trust, Unite, Train, Follow and Lead.

Each of these key words were discussed in relation to various Bible stories and the children learned about some of God's important servants.

Our VBS mission project this year was the Harmony House, which is a family visitation center in Fort Collins where supervised visitations and exchanges

can occur. Harmony House's mission is to allow children to have visits or exchanges with their family in a safe, non-threatening, home-like setting under the supervision of a trained community volunteer. Our VBS children collected needed paper products for Harmony House, as well as cash donations totaling \$766.00. The children also created beautiful art canvases to be hung in Harmony House and made blankets to be given to children in need. It was a great opportunity for them to share God's love with others in our community.

LEARNING FOR LIFE

Recently, we've been hearing and reading about infectious diseases in the world. Don Messer, Director of the Center for Global Pastoral Ministries at Iliff, recently spoke to our congregation about the staggering impact of HIV/AIDS on the developing world. Andrew Speaker, a man infected with multiple-drug-resistant tuberculosis, has been in the media spotlight for potentially exposing hundreds of others, although whether travel restrictions were in place is questionable. Both of these men are opening our eyes not only to the devastating impact of infectious diseases in many parts of our world, but also to the very real threat they pose to people everywhere. Another answer to the question "What can I, as one person, do?" is contained in the book by Tracy Kidder, Mountains Beyond Mountains: The Who Would Cure the World.

While we may not be in positions to "cure the world", by being forgiving, accepting and generous in our relationships we can greatly impact the world around us.

CONFERENCES, CONFERENCES, AND MORE CONFERENCES

This past month your clergy and 10 members of the church attended the Annual Conference in Denver of the United Methodist Church. We participate in voting and electing and we heard sermons and lectures. We saw old friends and we met new friends, and the meeting lasted four days.

The result: Our Church's Wider Mission number will be determined by sending 11% of the adjusted income for each month.

Pam Everhart was commissioned as a Probationary Member of the Annual Conference. Pam was a student in the United Methodist Doctrine Class I taught two years ago. She is one of the promising graduates of Iliff School of Theology, and we are going to enjoy working with her. She officially begins her work at First Church on July 1st. Joel Kershaw completed his second of three years probation. He will be ordained Elder next June.

Nancy Boswell was appointed to Christ United Methodist Church. She was a student in the class I taught several years ago. They are fortunate to have her as their pastor.

The Bishop from Angola was with us. He and his wife made a good impression and helped us understand how

important our connection with the Angola Methodist Church has been. We are doing some good work in Angola.

We elected delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conference. General Conference has six delegates (three clergy and three laity), and Jurisdictional has 12 delegates (the six delegates elected to General Conference and six additional delegates). General Conference meets in April of 2008 in Fort Worth, Texas and will re-write the rules of the church (The Book of Discipline). Jurisdictional Conference meets in July of 2008 in Oregon and will elect a Bishop to replace the one who is retiring.

Emily Dawson-Peterson was elected as a Jurisdictional Conference delegate. I was elected a General Conference and Jurisdictional Conference delegate. We will try to represent you as best we are able.

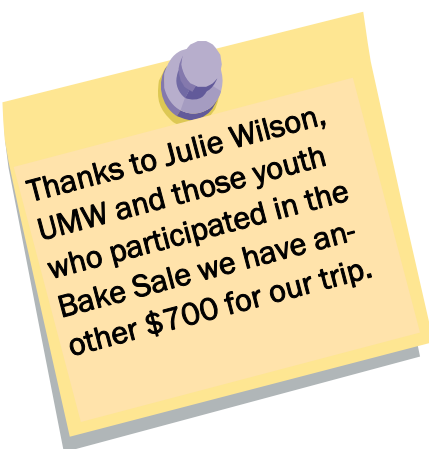
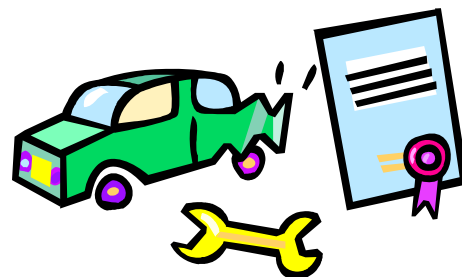

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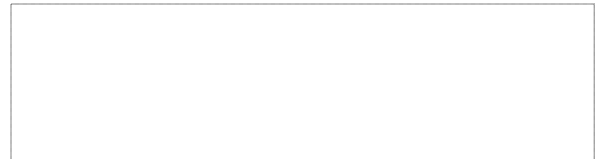
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GREAT OPPORTUNITIES TO GROW IN OUR CHRISTIAN DISCIPLESHIP

A series of biblical studies under the banner of *Disciple* will be offered this Fall. The studies are appropriate for persons who are just beginning in the study of the Bible through those who have considerable knowledge. The purpose is not only to gain knowledge but to discover what the Bible has to say that relates to the lives we live today. These studies are 9 months in length and involve daily reading, reflective questions, weekly 2 hour meetings, and video presentations. The following classes will be offered this fall:

Disciple 1: Becoming Disciples Through Bible Study. Tells the biblical story from Creation to Revelation. This is an introduc-

tory study. Persons with no, little or more advanced knowledge of the Bible are urged to participate. Will meet on Thursday mornings, 8:00-10:00 A.M. led by Diane Smith.

Disciple 2: Into the Word into the World. Focuses on Genesis and Exodus in the Old Testament, and Luke and Acts in the New Testament. Will meet on Tuesday afternoons or evenings, led by Gary Conner.

Disciple 4: Under the Tree of Life. Covers the Prophets and the letters of Paul. Will meet on Monday evenings, 6:30-8:30 P.M., led by Roberta Binder.

Disciple 5: Jesus in the Gospels. Examines the four Gospels

through which an encounter with a Jesus who is both hard to ignore and hard to control is experienced. Will meet on Monday evenings, 6:30-8:30 P.M., led by Ray Miller.

Cost is \$40 for participants which includes a study manual; \$50 for Jesus in the Gospels.

Registration will begin in late July, or immediately by calling the church office. An information meeting for persons who wish to know more about these Disciple classes will be offered on Thursday, July 26 and 11:15 A.M. and 6:30 P.M. at the church.
