BASKETBALL ANYONE?

In church work there are few points at which one can identify achievement. Working in the church is one of those strange vocations that makes shoveling snow or mowing grass rewarding. At least with grass mowing and snow shoveling you know where you began, you see how far you got, and when you finish you realize completion. Church work is more ambiguous. When you work in the church someone may ask, "How are you doing?" Truth is, you can't tell how you are doing. You may have preached a pretty good sermon a week ago, but the congregation will only remember your last one; not your best one. The committees may have completed a highly improbable task that required major coordination and lots of hard work, and all that will be recalled is the fact that the fire alarm went off in the middle of it or the grass on the west side of the building needs water. It's just the nature of the work. Since it involves God it produces no small amount of humility, and since it is of God, the achievements are subtle, but significant; undetectable but important.

Sometime in the bowels of July the Trustees authorized

and a family from the church donated a basketball goal to be installed in the parking lot. I cannot express the great feeling of joy I feel for this accomplishment. I have been able to put basketball goals in three of the six churches I've served over the 37 years of my ministry. The reason I am ordained is largely due to the fact that my home church had a gymnasium and the minister let me play basketball instead of having to go to MYF (we didn't have a youth minister like Joel). When I left my last church the staff put money together and gave me the gift of a portable basketball goal that I could put up at home. Since there was no place to

served before I came to Fort Collins built a gymnasium and the last Sunday I was there they named the Court after me (I wish they hadn't). When they hosted an event to raise money to send mosquito nets to Africa they had two celebrities—me and a Denver Nugget. We played a game of basketball on a hot Saturday afternoon and I beat the Nugget. After that a teenager defeated me and put me out of

the game.

After the installation of our basketball goal an irate neighbor called to complain that putting that up was a mistake. The fear is it will create trash and late night games. Let's hope that doesn't happen.

The equipment is wonderful. The metal rim is loose enough to be forgiving if you hit it most of the time it will go in. I have had the occasion to play two of our young people a game of HORSE. I defeated Kelsey and James.

On August 25 from 9-11 we are going to have a tournament. I plan to put together a team from the church staff and we plan to win. Sometime in the future we will want to resume the issue of a Family Life Center. It was in the plan for the future of our church; we just haven't been able to do that. Perhaps that's what we try to do next.

Some will say basketball is a poor incentive as an instrument for a church's ministry. It does bring us together in ways nothing else we have here at the church is able to do. Progress has been made. We have taken a major step as a church. We will try to keep the trash out of the parking lot and not have basketball games that begin after dusk.

We also encourage you to invite neighbors, friends, family members...anyone. Do tell others about what is happening at your church. It's all about God and God's will for our lives on this earth.



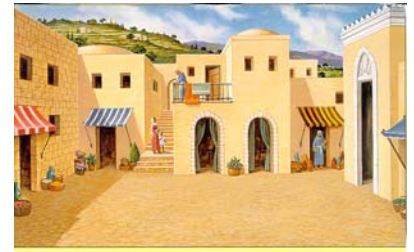
THOUGHTS FROM BEV

DISCIPLE REGISTRATION IS ON!

Four Disciple classes will be offered this Fall. Registration is taking place now through August 30th. Classes will begin the week of September 10. Disciple courses last 30-32 weeks and involve daily Bible readings, a two hour class session which involves sharing of what we have read, learned, and consideration of what that means for our lives as Believers. The classes to be held in 2007 are:

1. Disciple I — *Becoming Disciples Through Bible Study*, Thursday mornings 8:00- 10:00 a.m. led by Diane Smith. Ideal for all. No previous Biblical knowledge is necessary to participate. This is a survey of the entire Bible and helps participants to grasp the whole scope of our biblical faith from Genesis to Revelation.

2. Disciple II — *Into the Word Into the World*, Tuesday afternoons, 1:00-3:00 p.m., led by Gary Conner. This is a more in depth study of four key books of the Bible, Genesis, Exodus, Luke and Acts. This study focuses

on beginnings of the faith of the Old Testament, and act of Deliverance in the Exodus

from Egypt; and beginning of the faith of the New Testament and the beginning of the church.

3. Disciple III — *Under the Tree of Life*, Monday evenings, 6:30-8:30 p.m., led by Roberta Binder. The messages of the Prophets of the Old Testament are as relevant to our lives and our world today as they were centuries ago. The letters of Paul help us grasp much of the early

teaching of the Christian church, which will challenge our lives today.

4. Disciple V — *Jesus in the Gospels*, Monday evenings, 6:30-8:30 p.m., led by Rev. Ray Miller. The Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John form the basis of this study. Similarities and differences in the witness of the Gospels will help us understand more fully who Jesus is and what it means to be followers of His Way.

What brought you to Colorado?

A seminary classmate of Todd's at Duke was a part of

What brought about your career change from teaching to ministering? What are the biggest challenges and greatest rewards in your new undertaking?

In many ways, teaching and ministry are connected. I see one of my strengths in ministry as the ability to help people make connections, which is primarily what good teaching is all about. As my husband's entered the ministry a decade ago, I felt my own vocational calling changing from being a connection-maker in the classroom to being a connection-maker in the Church, and most importantly, in connecting the Church to the world outside its walls. My calling is primarily a calling of connection.

Do you have any particular goals or hopes for your work with this church?

One thing I believe in strongly is teamwork. We must all commit to this congregation with our prayers, presence, gifts and service. *All* of us. One person does not a church make. One person does not a ministry make.

daily commute from Frederick to Fort Collins?

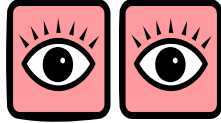

LEARNING FOR LIFE

A book that many members of FUMC have recently read is The Faith Club by Ranya Idliby, Suzanne Oliver and Priscilla Warner. These three women – a Muslim, a Christian and a Jew – originally joined forces to write a book for their children showing the connections between their three faiths. Early on in their discussions, though, their differences led to misunderstandings. In this book, we follow their struggle “to confront what divided [them] in matters of faith, God and religion ... [and] to reveal [their] own worst fears, prejudices, and stereotypes.”

Each woman not only gained new understanding and greater respect for the other religions, but also found a deeper connec-

tion with her own religion.

The challenges these women encountered are no different from the ones we all encounter when we sincerely want to understand how another individual experiences the world, someone we see as “other”, as different from us in some fundamental way. The difference could be one of religion, of race or ethnicity, of sexual orientation or less obvious ways that result from different life experiences. The point is, how can we get beyond what divides us, our “fears, prejudices and stereotypes” about the other, to what unites us?

Can we relate to others in a

new way, a truly authentic way that recognizes and honors the sacred in the other? Can we be in dialog

with others, seeking to understand their beliefs and perspectives, without feeling like we have to change them? As The Faith Club illustrates, doing so can be very challenging, even when on the surface there is so much similarity – the three women are all middle class mothers of about the same age and educational level.

This fall we'll have an opportunity to discuss The Faith Club either in person or in an on-line book discussion group, something new that we'll be trying. We'll not only become more knowledgeable about Islam and Judaism, but also about the process of dialog, the goal of which is understanding rather than agreement.

WORLD-CLASS ALPINIST & CELEBRATED JOURNALIST

Pete Takeda, author of the 2007 Himalayan Literature Award winning book, AN EYE AT THE TOP OF THE WORLD, will be with us on **Wednesday, August 22nd at 7:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary.**

His presentation brings us a first-person multi-media accounting of the importance of leadership, risk and security as he unearths the terrifying legacy of the Cold War's most daring CIA operation.

In the mid-1960's, with the goal of gathering intelligence on China, the CIA undertook secret climbing expeditions to put a nuclear-powered spy device on top of Nanda Devi – one of the Himalayas' most remote and forbidden peaks. Because of storms the device was abandoned, eventually avalanched and never recovered. To this day the four pounds of plutonium remain locked in the glacier beneath

the mountain.

Last year Pete led an expedition to retrace the steps of the climbers who undertook this clandestine operation. His account to unravel the mystery of Nanda Devi is death defying and a story not to be missed.

Pete Takeda's exploits have been covered in *Sports Illustrated*, *Men's Health*, *Outside* and by *ESPN*.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY MONTH

August has been designated Habitat For Humanity month at FUMC. An information table will be available in Fellowship Hall throughout August to provide information regarding the programs function and the opportunities available to the congregation for participation in a Habitat for Humanity project.

Nearly 40 years ago, an attorney, Millard Fuller and his wife Linda, set out to develop a program that would virtually eliminate sub-standard housing in southeast Georgia. The result of their dream has been the construction of over 200,000 well built and attractive houses in the

US and many foreign countries for those clients meeting basic requirements. But this program is not just about building houses. It's about lifting people out of the depths of despair regardless of race, creed, gender or religious choice. It's about providing children and families with a stable environment where they can grow without fear of the gangs, drugs and other criminal activity that so many live with prior to being selected for a Habitat home.

It is a delight to gather before our Lord with reverence and praise.

The clients are taught how to take care of a home, and how to manage their finances.

The programs success is due

to the unselfish volunteers and financial donors who have great faith in the program and give their time freely and lovingly.
